

2026 Legislative Session Summary

Centennial State Prosperity works to grow our economy by raising Coloradans' incomes and lowering costs, so hardworking people have the opportunity to build a good life. This session, CSP advanced policies to make Colorado more affordable by lowering the cost of housing and fighting policies that would have raised health care and prescription medication costs.

BY THE NUMBERS:

- **1227** CSP supporters called their legislators
- **1270** CSP supporters emailed their legislators
- Organized **80** Coloradans to come to the capitol to testify on priority bills
- Brought CSP supporters and partners to the capitol to directly lobby legislators **7** times across priority bills
- Over **229k** views on social media posts related to housing, health care, and affordability
- Generated **28** media hits on priority bills

PRIORITY BILLS

Support: House Bill 1001: Housing Opportunities Made Easier (HOME) Act

Sponsors: Representatives Boesenecker and Mabrey; Senators Exum and Gonzales
Builds more homes hardworking Coloradans can afford by removing red tape so public schools and certain non-profits can build housing on the land they own.

Signed into law on March 25, 2026

CSP Coalition: Led 62 organizations to help pass the bill

Support: House Bill 1308: Building More Starter Homes by Allowing Flexible Lot Sizes

Sponsors: Representatives Boesenecker and Woodrow; Senators Amabile and Ball
Addressed our state's growing housing shortage and affordability crisis by allowing homeowners to sell off part of the lot their home is on for the construction of another house, creating more homes that are less expensive and require less land.

Postponed indefinitely by the Senate Local Government & Housing Committee

CSP Coalition: Led 20 organizations to help pass the bill

Oppose: Senate Bill 140: Stopping Colorado's Prescription Drug Affordability Board From Lowering the Cost of the Most Expensive Prescription Medications

Sponsors: Senators Frizell and Marchman; Representatives Gilchrist and Johnson
Would prevent Colorado's Prescription Drug Affordability Board (PDAB) from reviewing and lowering the cost of hundreds of commonly-prescribed medications that Coloradans struggle to afford every day.

Postponed indefinitely by the House Health & Human Services Committee

CSP Coalition: Led 16 partner organizations along with doctors and patient advocates to help defeat the bill

With costs continuing to rise for hardworking Coloradans, CSP's work this legislative session focused on making housing more affordable and ensuring the state can continue to lower the cost of the most expensive prescription medications through the Prescription Drug Affordability Board. We're grateful for our organizational partners, bill sponsors, and every CSP member that took time to make their voices heard on our priority legislation to ensure a more affordable Colorado for hardworking people.
